A 54-year-old white man presents with a 3-year history of bilateral, tender axillary boils and scarring. He is obese and a smoker. His medical history includes diabetes, hypercholesterolemia, and hypertension. He does not have a personal or family history of gastrointestinal symptoms.

The most likely diagnosis is

1. Carbuncles
2. Erysipelas
3. Hidradenitis suppurativa
4. Pilonidal cysts
5. Crohn disease

Can you identify this condition?

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A 55-year-old man presents to your office with a 3-month history of a painless lesion at the medial angle of his right eye. Results of ocular examination are normal. He does not have a palpable preauricular lymph node on the left or right side. He has no meaningful ocular history, with no previous ocular surgeries or trauma. His medical, family, and medication histories are non-contributory. He reports that he lived on a farm as a child and experienced several facial sunburns.

The most likely diagnosis is

1. Benign nasolacrimal duct cyst
2. Basal cell carcinoma
3. Seborrheic keratosis
4. Sebaceous cell carcinoma

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
