She initially developed this ulcer 3 years ago following a traumatic incident. The ulcer is very painful and has not responded to multiple courses of antibiotics and different dressings. She is currently taking acetaminophen and short-acting morphine. She is also taking 5 mg of prednisone per day for her rheumatoid arthritis.

The most likely diagnosis is
