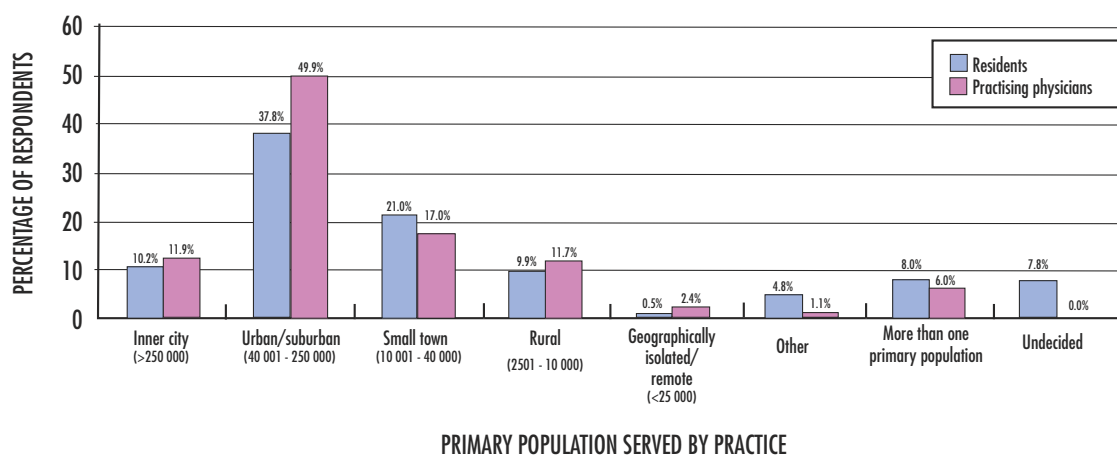
Care today and residents' care in the future

To compare patients (rural or urban) that physicians care for today with patients that residents think they will care for in the future, we asked them these questions.

- Family physicians were asked: "Please describe the population **primarily** served by your practice"—Inner city, Urban or suburban, Small town, Rural, Geographically isolated or remote, Other.
- Family medicine residents were asked: "Please describe the population **primarily** served by the kind of practice that you plan to undertake"—Inner city (more than 250 000 persons), Urban (100 001 to 250 000 persons), Suburban (40 001 to 100 000 persons), Small town (10 001 to 40 000 persons), Rural (2501 to 10 000 persons), Geographically isolated or remote (less than 2500 persons), Undecided, Other or combination.
