Can you identify this condition?

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A 53-year-old man presents to the emergency department complaining of a sudden but painless onset of severe vision loss in his left eye of 10 hours' duration. He does not have a history of flashing lights, headache, pain, general weakness, or sensory changes. His past medical history is remarkable for diabetes mellitus, hypertension, and hypercholesterolemia. Dilated fundus examination is shown in the figure above.

The most likely diagnosis is

1. Retinal detachment
2. Central retinal vein occlusion
3. Wet macular degeneration
4. Central retinal artery occlusion

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
