Can you identify this condition?

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A 55-year-old woman presents with a long-standing history of multiple ivory-white atrophic patches involving the vulvar and perianal area that appear in a “figure-eight” (bidirectional) pattern. Superficial telangiectases are present. The involved areas are pruritic and the patient complains of dysuria, dyspareunia, and pain with defecation. In addition, the patient has several ivory-white papules coalescing into atrophic plaques on her upper back.

The most likely diagnosis is

1. Lichen planus
2. Scleroderma
3. Vitiligo
4. Discoid lupus erythematosus
5. Lichen sclerosus

An 11-year-old girl presented with a solitary, slightly tender, semifirm, erythematous nodule about 1.3 cm in diameter, situated in the right submandibular area. The lesion had enlarged slowly over the past 2 months. There was no associated fever, chills, or other systemic symptoms, and no history of preceding lesions or insect bites at the site. She also had no history of travel. The patient was healthy and taking no medications. Her family history was noncontributory.

The most likely diagnosis is

1. Epidermal inclusion cyst
2. Cutaneous lymphoid hyperplasia
3. Spitz nevus
4. Lymphoma cutis
5. Pyogenic granuloma

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
