



Can you identify this condition?

A 7-year-old boy presented with an asymptomatic, slightly hypopigmented patch over his left abdominal area. The patch appeared shortly after birth and has been relatively stable in size, texture, and shape ever since. Skin examination revealed a unilateral, irregular, hypopigmented macule over the left abdomen, with normal surrounding skin. Rubbing the lesion induced erythema. No other areas were affected. Wood lamp examination revealed an off-white accentuation without fluorescence. The boy was otherwise healthy and did not have a family history of a similar condition.

The most likely diagnosis is

1. Vitiligo
2. Tuberous sclerosis
3. Nevus depigmentosus
4. Nevus anemicus

A 34-year-old white woman presents with several small, circular, red maculopapular lesions over her anterior chest and arms. The lesions have been in place for a number of years, with no recent changes. They range in size from 1 to 3 mm and are nonblanchable when compressed. The patient is otherwise healthy and is not taking any medications. The only other dermatologic findings are scattered, small, benign nevi that are long-standing and unchanged.

The most likely diagnosis is

1. Venous lakes
2. Angiokeratoma
3. Lymphangioma simplex
4. Senile hemangioma
5. Kaposi sarcoma

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
