### Can you identify this condition?

**A** 12-year-old boy presented with a 2-year history of pruritic, erythematous, and scaly papules arranged in a linear distribution on the left scrotal sac. The lesions had first appeared at the age of 10 years and, since then, had gradually increased in size. He had received several treatments including topical steroids and antifungals without improvement. The boy was otherwise healthy and had no associated cutaneous, skeletal, neurologic, or ocular abnormalities. There was no family history of a similar condition. Complete physical examination revealed no associated abnormality.

#### The most likely diagnosis is

1. Noninflammatory epidermal nevus
2. Inflammatory linear verrucous epidermal nevus
3. Linear psoriasis
4. Lichen striatus

### Can you identify this condition?

**A** 54-year-old white woman with a history of breast cancer presents to the emergency department with visual distortion in the left eye. Her visual acuity is 20/20 in each eye. No relative afferent pupillary defect is detected and confrontational visual fields are full. A dilated fundoscopic examination reveals a lesion in the macular region of the left eye. Enabling A-scan ultrasonography reveals a choroidal lesion with medium internal reflectivity.

#### The most likely diagnosis is

1. Choroidal melanoma
2. Central serous chorioretinopathy
3. Choroidal metastasis
4. Choroidal nevus
