## CHECK YOUR BABY'S STOOL COLOUR <u>EVERY DAY</u> FOR THE FIRST MONTH AFTER BIRTH TO SCREEN FOR BILIARY ATRESIA

What is Biliary Atresia? Biliary Atresia is a rare but serious liver disease that begins to affect newborns in the first month of life. It is the most common reason why children need a liver transplant and it is life-threatening if it is not treated.

What are the warning signs of Biliary Atresia? It is very normal to see yellow colour of your baby's skin or eyes (a condition known as jaundice) in the first few days after birth. However, some babies may have jaundice that lasts longer than two weeks. If your baby has jaundice for longer than two weeks and also has pale yellow, chalk white or clay coloured stools, these are warning signs that your baby could have Biliary Atresia.

How can you help screen for Biliary Atresia? Check your baby's stool colour <u>EVERY DAY</u> for the first month after birth. If at any time you notice that your baby has an abnormal stool colour (Abnormal Stool Colours - number 1, 2, or 3 pictured above), please promptly contact the BC Infant Stool Colour Card® Screening Program at:
